The rythm of CQ will ring out again for Field Day the weekend of June 27-28. Portable operation simulating emergency conditions will afford us valuable experience and good fellowship. Get a few extra winks of sleep, tune up the vocal cords, and come join the fun.

We will be setting up once again this year in Fritsche Cemetery Park which has proved ideal for this operation in the past. Operating class 2A, there will be two normal HF stations plus a station on the Novice bands and a satellite station. Propagation promises to offer some interesting challenges this year and how better to learn the tricks of the trade than to be on hand. There will be opportunities to see and do things we only think about the rest of the year. Those new to the sport can get a grip on those mysterious things you've heard about. Bring a friend along.

We will begin setting up about 1 PM Friday. With a 20x40 foot cover to erect and three towers and antennas to raise there will be plenty to do. Final tweaking will be completed Saturday morning before the contest starts at 1PM. At 1 PM Sunday we will conclude the operation, tear down, pack up, and head for home. 
Welcome to new NARS members Tim Wallace, N5ZIR, and Steve Baum, AA6VO. We are glad to have you.

* * * * PROPAGATION * * * * * by Roy Hradilek, AD5Q

We have had some fine conditions on 15. Paths have been open to all parts of Asia during the day, with excellent openings into the late evening. These conditions are seasonal and we have enjoyed them through the sunspot peak, but how now? For the first time in several years, the solar flux has dipped below 100. This occurred during the WPX CW contest. 15 Meter paths to Europe and Japan were marginal throughout the event, mostly because of the lower MUF's. Morning daypath propagation to Europe shifted to a lower frequency, and 20 Meters was found in excellent shape.

At this stage in the solar cycle we can usually expect fluxes to range between 100 and 150. Flux swings effect our HF bands more dramatically here than at higher levels. 15 will be less reliable, and fall conditions on 10 this year will remind many Novice & Tech DX'ers why they should work on their code and upgrade. We still have plenty of good propagation left on 10 and '5, and when fluxes are low, a corresponding OX path can be found on a lower frequency band.

Summer absorbtion starts to effect 15 during June as the spring DX season comes off its peak. Daytime absorbtion will be a noticeable factor by end of month (Field Day). With fluxes at the higher end of our range, good daypath conditions are still possible, but the late afternoon and evening paths will be better. There are no reliable daypath bands in July because summer absorbtion is at its worst.

Most of the nightpath stuff is on 20, but 40 is also pretty good. After sunrise (on 20) we get our usual summer pipeline to the Pacific and far east, with long path to Africa and the Indian Ocean. LP to VU and EU is out of season, and is especially difficult when fluxes are low. Watch for especially good short path instead, with morning high latitude paths broadly open from the NW to NE.

Field Day - Why? by Ken Harlan, KA5AKG

In his National Contesters Journal column, "Contest Tips, Tricks & Tecniques," Gary Sutcliffe, W9XT, questions the Field Day contest. While FD is configured as a contest and intended to promote emergency preparedness, are there more valid alternative objectives? Contributor Roy Hradilek, AD5Q, questions the level of competition due to the relatively inexperienced composition of most groups, particularly related to CW. The pattern of scoring results supports a contention that a concentration serious contesters can dominate the contest results.

The article infers that there is more to FD than just scores. Roy suggests that the event should really be used to introduce Amateur Radio to the public and introduce other Hams to contesting. Paul Schaffenberger, KB8N, says it is a great time for learning and trying new things such as QRP contesting, new antennas and the like. George Fremin, WB5VZL, recognizes that along with other considerations it is just fun. We each have our individual reasons for participating. If they can be all these and more, WHY NOT?
